Advocacy

At our Zonta District 4 Zoom meeting a power point **from the Zonta Foundation** provided information on accomplishments of helping women in many countries. Today's section only highlights a couple:

<u>The goal for Adolescents Girls' Health & Protection in Peru</u> --- improve the capacity of services to respond to the health needs of adolescent girls – in a timely manner and prevent violence in schools in to regions - Huancavelica and Ucayali (east Africa).

- 3,749 (72 girls) were reached through primary adolescent health care services.
- 86 principals and teachers have enhanced their knowledge on awareness of violence prevention strategies and response to violence.
- 10 tutors were certified to support the in-service training programs for health personnel. 400 health establishment will benefit from assistance provided to train personnel on comprehensive adolescent health care in the context of COVID 19

<u>In Madagascar the goal is to address education and gender inequity through approaches targeted toward adolescents -</u>

1564 household caring for 4793 children under 18 received a condition cash transfer. Here are a couple \$ impacts of our support –

- \$100 could enable three children to benefit form comprehensive 3 month life skills courses with strategies to reduce violence
- \$500 provide 222 children benefited with Life Skill training materials they could not receive during COVID education closures.
- \$5,000 could support 1 year of communication for development plan empower women and encourage school attendance.

When donating any \$ amount to the Zonta Foundation, we are helping girls and women lives in around the world.

- Cardi B first woman to have every song on an album to be certified platinum.
- Queen Anunay first woman to attain the uniformed rank of Assistant Fire Chief for the District of Columbia's Fire and Emergency Medical Services department, USA.
- Melissa Baumann first woman appointed president of Ohio Northern University in Ohio, USA.
- Barbara Bellefeuille first woman appointed president of Bethel University in Indiana, USA.
- Nicola Benedetti first woman and first Scot to be appointed director of the Edinburgh International Festival, which presents a program featuring the finest performers and ensembles from the worlds of dance, opera, music and theatre.
